

From the Pastor

Mary, Mother of God

Tomorrow marks the end of the octave of Christmas, the eight days of Christmas, and on tomorrow, January 1st, we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. Yes, tomorrow is also New Year's Day, but don't let tonight's and tomorrow's parties and resolutions overshadow the religious significance of the day.

Mary has many titles, but the title, Mother of God, was given by way of the Council of Ephesus in 431 A.D. – Incidentally, tradition tells us that Mary lived in Ephesus after Pentecost and before her Assumption. Defending the full divinity and humanity of Christ, the hierarchy of the Church pronounced Mary to be the Mother of God. They rightly argued that if Jesus is truly God and Mary is the Mother of Jesus, then Mary can correctly be called the Mother of God.

Marian spirituality is the fastest way to the heart of her Son. As we continue to mull over possible New Year's resolutions, perhaps one of them could include a Marian devotion: Praying a daily rosary or a daily decade of the rosary, reciting the Litany of Loreto, praying the Angelus prayer, joining in the Mother of Perpetual Help devotions after our morning Masses on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, wearing a Miraculous Medal or being enthroned in the scapular, etc.

What will be your New Year's spiritual resolutions? May the Lord richly bless you in 2024 and gather you and your families into His loving arms. We wish you all a Happy New Year!

The Holy Family

Today, the Sunday within the octave of Christmas, is usually the Feast of the Holy Family. This feast may somehow seem repetitive since figures of Joseph and Mary have long adorned our nativities and without Joseph and Mary's acceptance of God's plan, Christ's birth would ostensibly not have come to fruition. The Holy Family is embedded with the mystery of the Nativity of Jesus, but Christmas is a specific recognition of Christ's birth. A separate celebration is necessary to honor the Holy Family and, thus, every family.

The family has been under attack since it was first formed in the Garden of Eden. Satan despises maleness and, especially, femaleness. He hates that couples radiate Christ's unconditional love through their sacrament of matrimony. He is livid that these same spouses can cooperate with God and bring about more human beings into the world through the gift of children. Lucifer is diametrically opposed to marriage and the family because it is the atom of society, the building block of civilization, and the very instrument through which our Savior came into the world.

It should be no surprise that the Devil loves to distort matrimony, human dignity, and the blessing of children. On December 18th, the Vatican issued a statement entitled "Fiducia Supplicans". While the statement reaffirms consistent Church teaching regarding matrimony between a man and a woman and, simultaneously, encourages the Church to assist all those in need of grace to know God's mercy, it has led to some confusion by some who, through ignorance or malice, have distorted its contents. Bishops Cozzens is the bishop of the Diocese of Crookston, MN. I know him to be a joyful, sincere, wise, and loving prelate. I find his recent commentary on "Fiducia Supplicans" to be most helpful. I hope it will be helpful to you, too.

Bishop Andrew Cozzens' statement re: Fiducia Supplicans

December 18, 2023 – Today the Vatican issued a statement, signed by the Holy Father, that spoke about offering blessings to people who currently live outside of the way of life commanded by Jesus. The document especially addresses the question of blessing "same-sex couples." The document from the Vatican, *Fiducia Supplicans* (FS), is clear that this is not in any way a change in the Church's teaching about marriage. The Church's teaching about marriage, since it is rooted in the Gospel we have received from Jesus Christ, is unchangeable. The Vatican document itself states that marriage is an "exclusive, stable, and indissoluble union between a man and a woman, naturally open to the generation of children" and the document also states that "this conviction is grounded in the perennial Catholic doctrine of marriage; it is only in this context that sexual relations find their natural, proper, and fully human meaning. The Church's doctrine on this point remains firm" (FS, 4).

What is the Vatican saying then? We know that Jesus Christ came to call all peoples to repentance and conversion because he desires that we would share with him the fullness of divine life in his kingdom. All of us are sinners and all of us are at different stages in this path of conversion. We see in the Gospels that whenever anyone comes to Jesus with a heart open to him, a heart seeking his mercy, Jesus always responds with mercy and inviting them to deeper repentance and discipleship. There are many examples of this in the Gospels, for example, the woman caught in adultery. Jesus receives her with mercy, saves her from the penalty of death, yet without condoning her sinful activity. He shows her love and mercy and calls her to a new life when he says, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, [and] from now on do not sin anymore" (John 8:11). Jesus does this for all of us.

Today's document emphasizes that people who come to the Church for a blessing, "acknowledge that the life of the Church springs from the womb of God's mercy and helps us to move forward, to live better, and to respond to the Lord's will" (FS, 20). Although it is impossible for us to bless a same-sex union, since any sexual-union outside of the marriage of one man and one woman is contrary to the Gospel, we may bless individuals who are not yet living in full accord with the Gospel, even those in a same-sex union. This is not a marriage blessing and should never be done in a liturgical or ceremonial way which would give the false idea of blessing a union contrary to the Gospel. It is not legitimate to use the Book of Blessings or any official ritual for blessing a union contrary to God's law. This is a blessing for persons who "recognizing themselves to be destitute and in need of his help—do not claim a legitimation of their own status, but who beg that all that is true, good, and humanly valid in their lives and their relationships be enriched, healed, and elevated by the presence of the Holy Spirit" (FS, 31).

This blessing is not for people seeking a legitimation of same sex union but for those seeking to live better: "there is no intention to legitimize anything, but rather to open one's life to God, to ask for his help to live better, and also to invoke the Holy Spirit so that the values of the Gospel may be lived with greater faithfulness" (FS 40).

The truth is we are all sinners and all of us need God's blessing to come to repentance and conversion. Often at Holy Mass we tell people who are not able to receive Holy Communion because they are living in a situation that is objectively outside of Jesus' commandments that they should come for a blessing. This reception of the blessing expresses a humble desire to grow in conversion, to seek his help to overcome sin, to seek holiness which is the goal of every Christian life.

Let us pray that many people, like the Woman at the well, Zacchaeus the tax collector, the Woman caught in adultery, or Saint Peter himself who was a grave sinner, may "feel that they are still blessed, notwithstanding their serious mistakes, that their heavenly Father continues to will their good and to hope that they will ultimately open themselves to the good" (FS, 27).

And of course, as the Vatican made clear, "Any blessing will be an opportunity for a renewed proclamation of the *kerygma*, an invitation to draw ever closer to the love of Christ" (FS, 44). Thus, when people come to the Church seeking her blessing let us also proclaim to them the saving love of Jesus found through repentance for all of us who are sinners.

The Holy Name of Jesus

This Wednesday, Jan. 3rd, is the Memorial of the Most Holy Name of Jesus, and it is probably the closest thing that Holy Name has to an official, patronal feast day. There are certainly Saints in the Redemptorist tradition dear to Holy Name parishioners, but when a parish is named after the Trinity or an aspect of God, e.g., Holy Name or Blessed Sacrament, it is more difficult to find a specific correlating feast day. Please pray for everyone in our parish of Holy Name and honor the saving Name of Jesus by assisting at daily Mass this Wednesday at 8:15 a.m. in Holy Name Church.

Application forms are available on the OACCW website <u>OACCW.org</u>, and have been sent to the guidance counselors of area high schools. All High School Senior Catholic young women are



For the 2024-25 leasing term, JPII Newman will offer a limited number of Academic (9-month) leases to all applicants. As always, those graduating during the 2024-25 school year will be eligible for a custom lease.

Pro-abortion groups want voters to enshrine a right to abortion <u>until birth</u> in the Nebraska constitution, according to proposed language released Wednesday
