You who all things can and know, Who on earth such food bestow. Grant us with your saints, though lowest,


Where the heav'nly feast you show, Fellow heirs and guests to be. Amen. Alleluia.

From the Pastor

Corpus Christi Sequence

"Lauda Sion" is an optional sequence that may be recited or preferably sung before the Alleluia in the Mass today, the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. At one time, there were over five thousand sequences in our liturgical tradition, but almost all of them were abolished in the 16th century at the Council of Trent. Sequences are liturgical poems that serve as hymns within the Liturgy of the Word and are connected to the Alleluia proclaimed before the Gospel. Today, only four sequences remain in our liturgical practice. "Victimae Paschali" is sung on Easter Sunday, and "Veni, Sancte Spiritus" is prayed on Pentecost. The "Stabat Mater" on Our Lady of Sorrows and the "Lauda Sion" on Corpus Christi are both optional in their usage.

Composed by St. Thomas Aquinas at the behest of Pope Urban IV for the new Feast of Corpus Christi in 1264, "Lauda Sion" receives its name from its first two lyrics: "Laud, O Zion." It is one of five hymns penned by the Angelic Doctor in praise of the Blessed Sacrament. The great Franciscan Saint,



St. Bonaventure, a contemporary of St. Thomas Aquinas, was also asked by the Pope to compose hymns for Corpus Christi. When St. Bonaventure read the exquisite compositions by St. Thomas, he was so enamored and impressed with them that he put down his pen and never completed his own.

"Lauda Sion" succinctly summarizes the Church's teaching on the Eucharist in eighty verses, broken down into five essential components and themes. 1. We praise God for instituting the Eucharist (verses 1-18); 2. The Eucharist has replaced the original Passover commemorated by the Israelites (verses 19-30); 3. Our doctrine of and teachings upon the Eucharist (verses 31-62); 4. This Eucharistic Bread has fulfilled the prophetic types found in the Old Testament, the lamb in the sacrifice of Isaac and the miraculous gift of manna in the desert (verses 63-70). 5. And a concluding prayer is offered to Christ, the Good Shepherd, that hopes all who sing and pray this song may behold His Face in Heaven (verses 71-80).

Because of its lyrical elegance and theological depth, I invite you to spend some time in prayer today and this week with the lyrics of this hymn. May we appreciate Christ and His Real Presence in the Blessed Sacrament more and more. O Sacrament Most Holy, O Sacrament Divine, all praise and all thanksgiving be every moment thine!

Annual Corpus Christi Procession

The largest Eucharistic Procession in Omaha starts today, Sunday, June 22nd, at 2:30 pm at Our Lady of Lourdes Church (2110 S. 32nd St.) and ends 1.4 miles later at St. Peter Catholic Church (27th and Leavenworth). Transportation will be available between both churches before and after the procession. In the event of rain, there will be a Holy Hour at St. Peter from 4-5 pm.

Archbishop McGovern's Pallium

Our new archbishop, the Most Rev. Michael McGovern, leaves for Rome today and will spend the week there. On the Solemnity of SS. Peter & Paul on June 29, next Sunday, Pope Leo XIV will bless the "pallia" and give each new metropolitan archbishop from around the world a pallium to be worn in his archdiocese. There will be eight new archbishops from the United States receiving their pallia.

including several of our Omaha priests - including our dear Fr. Dan Kampschneider, who served a long tenure as pastor at St. Philip Neri-Blessed Sacrament Parish - will accompany Archbishop McGovern to Rome.

As explained in the *Dictionary of the Liturgy* by Rev. Jovian Lang, OFM, the pallium is

a band of white cloth, woven from white wool of two lambs annually offered to the Holy Father on the feast of St. Agnes, worn over the chasuble in the form of a collar, by the Pope, patriarchs, and archbishops. This circular strip of white wool, about two and one-half inches wide, from which two short bands, made of the same material, hang down over the chest and the back, ending with black silk pendants, is decorated with six crosses of black taffeta, four placed in the circle and the two others in the hanging bands. Besides indicating a superior episcopal authority and dignity, it is also a symbol of communion with the Church.

Placed on the shoulders of the prelate, the pallium symbolizes the profound humility of the Savior and the erring sheep that the Good Shepherd places on His shoulder to bring back to the flock. The four crosses in the circle symbolize the four cardinal virtues of justice, fortitude, temperance, and prudence; the two hanging bands symbolize the active life of Martha and the contemplative one of Mary. In 1978 (Saint) Paul VI restricted its use to metropolitan archbishops and the Latin Patriarch in Jerusalem, who wear it at jurisdictional or Sacramental functions or ceremonies. (1989, p. 476)

Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

This Friday, June 27th, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. The solemnity always occurs on the Friday after the second Sunday after Pentecost, the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. The feast has evolved over time. Jesus Christ miraculously revealed Himself on multiple occasions to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque between 1673 and 1675. Probably the most important of these apparitions occurred on December 27, 1673, and June 16, 1675, the latter date providing the inspiration to situate the annual solemnity in the month of June.

The liturgical feast was initially approved in 1765 by Pope Clement XIII, and it was later expanded to the whole Catholic Church in 1856 by Pope Pius IX. The feast day received new texts and was elevated to the highest rank of liturgical solemnity by Pope Pius XI in 1928, and it was further enhanced with thematic flourishes because of "Haurietis Aquas", the encyclical on devotion to the Sacred Heart promulgated by Pope Pius XII in 1956.

Unlike most liturgical solemnities, the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart doesn't celebrate a specific event in Salvation History. It celebrates salvation itself and commemorates the central truth that "God is love" and the Lord's perpetual desire that all generations come to know His love through His Son's opened heart on the Cross. This annual solemnity dovetails with the devotion to the Sacred Heart we commemorate on the First Friday of each month. Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us!

In honor of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, we will have Eucharistic Exposition on Friday, June 27, from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. in St. Philip Neri Church.

As we celebrate the Easter Season and the Resurrection of Jesus we are especially thankful for the prayers and support we receive from our Parish Family - we could not do this alone! Please continue to help us on our Mission of Charity and also in our support of the Holy Name Food Pantry. Canned goods, pasta, and breakfast cereal are popular items requested and the need is always growing. Since the beginning of January we have contributed over 52 sacks and 12 large and small boxes of groceries to the pantry!
